
Jeffrey Stanley's play *Tesla's Letters*, a wartime drama set in Yugoslavia, premiered at The Ensemble Studio Theatre, directed by Curt Dempster and funded by a grant from the Alfred P. Sloan Foundation. It has been performed in the UK at the Edinburgh Fringe Festival and throughout the US. The script has been published by Samuel French which named the play one of the ten best dramas of 1999. He was commissioned by the Mill Mountain Theatre to write the play *Medicine*, *Man*, a comedy about medical ethics and NASCAR, which world premiered in 2003 directed by Jere Hodgin, and which will receive its Southwest premiere at Theatre Three Dallas in 2005. He was a Copeland Fellow in Playwriting at Amherst College where he completed his play UFOs Over Brooklyn. His work has also been performed at LaMama E.T.C., the Chashama Arts Space, and is frequently read at Naked Angels. His screenplay Brain On Fire, which he will direct, has been optioned by producer Matt Myers with casting by Mabry-Super (this project was represented at the 2004 IFP Market). He has also written screenplays for Oscar-winning director Barbara Kopple and for

Andrew Lauren Productions. Screenwriting awards include the Alfred P. Sloan Foundation Award, the New York Picture Company Award for Best Dramatic Screenplay, the Laurel Entertainment Award for Screenwriting Excellence, and a residency at Yaddo. In addition to teaching playwriting and screenwriting at NYU he has lectured at Amherst College, Gotham Writers' Workshop, and The Imaginary Academy film and theatre workshop in Croatia sponsored by the Soros Foundation. Stanley has also appeared as a guest writer in The New York Times and in Time Out New York. He is a member of the advisory panel for Boston University's Center for Millennial Studies' scholarly journal on millennialism in pop culture to debut in 2005. Stanley holds an MFA from the Dramatic Writing Program at NYU's Tisch School of the Arts where he studied under playwright David Ives. He received his BFA in Film & Television Production from Tisch with a minor in cultural anthropology. Stanley likes to canoe the Gowanus Canal, and is as comfortable in jeans as he is in a tux. Sometimes he even wears both.
